Film Analysis for Home Movies

Home movies provide evidence of the past and are valuable resources for historical research. Below are questions you can ask. Then consider those questions in relation to any and all historical, cultural, social, political, and economic questions that might be associated with the filmmaker or subjects of the films in a greater historical context (i.e. why these films are important).

Background information about the filmmaker and The Andrew Avery Collection: Andrew Avery was a Bainbridge, Georgia resident, agriculturalist, Baptist, and educator. He depicts diverse aspects of life in Bainbridge and surrounding areas such as Climax and Attapulgus. The bulk of what he filmed was farming and agricultural practices, local students, and schools. He also shot a reel depicting African American life in Bainbridge. These films were all shot sometime between 1930 and 1950. The University of Georgia's Walter J. Background Information on the footage: The Bellamy Salute was the primary way student in the United States said the pledge of allegiance before 1940. With the rise of Fascism in the 1940s, in Italy and Germany, Congress required schools to switch over to the "hand over heart" method.
